ADDENDUM NO.1

This addendum issued November 13, 2019 becomes in its entirety a part of the Request for Proposals RFP #600-20-19-REBID as is fully set forth herein:

Item 1: Q: I have been reviewing and collecting the information needed for procurements related to mold abatement. Will we still be able to participate if our HAZMAT abatement only consists of mold? There seems to be a lot of lead and asbestos abatement requirements that we don't do.

A: **Yes. In general many firms might not have all the expertise and they have options to choose other experts through Sub-Consultants. If sub-consultants are added in the proposal then follow the RFP's Section IV, Part D for Proposed staffing and Sub-Consultant's responsibilities and qualifications.**

Item 2: Q: What is the total yearly amount paid by HACP for mold abatement last calendar (2018) year?

A: **The previous contract procurement did not include mold abatement.**

Item 3: Q: Will we still be able to participate if our HAZMAT abatement expertise only consists of mold, duct cleaning/disinfecting and odor?

A: **Yes. Please see Item #1.**

Item 4: Q: Can you provide Canfield Development Inc. with the results of the Evaluation of our bid proposal we submitted for RFP# 600-20-19, both the Technical and the Fee Proposal, since we were told this was not awarded based on evaluations by the Committee so that we can see where we may need to improve at in order to be within to be awarded the project.

A: **If you would like a debriefing please contact Mr. Kim Detrick, Director of Procurement/Chief Contracting Officer. Otherwise you must file a Right to Know Request, the form and contact person can be found on our website www.hacp.org.**

Item 5: Q: Please provide the annual total dollar amount of Task Orders under the previous abatement contract for the prior five years.

A: **\$190,714.60 over 3 years.**

Item 6: Q: Please provide copies the bid results from the last time this contract was bid.
A: **This was done as an RFP. There were no "bid results."**

Item 7: Q: Page 3, Section II "Scope of Services", 3rd paragraphs from end, last sentence "The wage determinations may vary by project setting and therefore may vary by Task Order (Residential, Building and Heavy Highway)"

The wage rates vary from approximately \$15.00 per hour to approximately \$50.00 per hour, but you are only asking for 1 unit price for each line item, how are we to price each line item, based on the highest wage we may have to pay? Will you be asking for a line item unit price based on each wage rate, or requesting a modifier to the unit prices based on which wage determination is to be used for each Task Order?

A: **Please use the revised Form of Bid for the proposals (see Attachment 1).**

Item 8: Q: Form of Bid, page 2, line item 4.

"Remove and legally dispose asbestos containing pipe insulation including valves and fittings as follows: (Actual pipe size used as basis)"

Under PA Davis Bacon wage law if the pipe is to be demolished it is Laborers work, if it is to be reinsulated it is Asbestos Workers work.

How is this to be priced? At lower Laborers rates, or higher Asbestos Worker rates?

A: **"The removal of all insulation materials, whether they contain asbestos or not, from mechanical systems (pipes, boilers, ducts, flues, breachings, etc.) will be recognized as work to be classified as Asbestos Worker." Asbestos Worker is required.**

Item 9: Q: Form of Bid, page 3 of 4, line item 6

"Remove and legally dispose of lead based paint form walls, ceilings, etc., at interior locations. This price shall not include renting of scaffolds or lifts"

Are you defining this work as abatement covered by PA Act 44 for Target Housing and as such would require licensed personnel, testing, etc.,?

Or, are you defining this work as repair covered by EPA RRP rule for Child Occupied Facilities?

Of neither?

A: **Yes. licensed personnel is required. EPA's RRP Rule requires two certifications: Firm Certification and Renovator Certification. All Firms receiving compensation for performing work on pre-1978 residential or child-occupied properties, including businesses owned and operated by one individual (sole proprietorships), must be Firm Certified. EPA Certified Firms must assign a Certified RRP Renovator to renovations subject to the RRP Rule.**

Item 10: Q: Form of Bid, page 4 of 4

“Asbestos Remover (Skilled Laborer Class 11)”

Is this supposed to be Skilled Laborer Class II? Class eleven does not exist. Abatement is Class III (3) for building laborers and it would be Group 7 or 8 for Heavy and Highway.

Please clarify.

A: Asbestos Remover (Skilled Laborer Class II).

Item 11: Q: There are two wage rates and only one bid form will a second bid form be provided or will there be a multiplier on a new bid form.

A: Please use the revised Form of Bid for the proposals (see Attachment 1).


Item 12: Q: The cutoff for questions was the 7th of November for RFP# 600-20-19 Rebid. However will the addendums from the original bid be part of the rebid?

Unlisted classifications needed for work not included within the scope of the classifications listed may be added after award only as provided in the labor standards contract clauses (29CFR 5.5 (a) (1) (ii)).

The body of each wage determination lists the classification and wage rates that have been found to be prevailing for the cited type(s) of construction in the area covered by the wage determination. The classifications are listed in alphabetical order of "identifiers" that indicate whether the particular rate is a union rate (current union negotiated rate for local), a survey rate (weighted average rate) or a union average rate (weighted union average rate).

Union Rate Identifiers

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than "SU" or "UAVG" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the "SU" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a new survey is conducted.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- * an existing published wage determination
- * a survey underlying a wage determination
- * a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on a wage determination matter
- * a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

Union Rate Identifiers

A four letter classification abbreviation identifier enclosed in dotted lines beginning with characters other than "SU" or "UAVG" denotes that the union classification and rate were prevailing for that classification in the survey. Example: PLUM0198-005 07/01/2014. PLUM is an abbreviation identifier of the union which prevailed in the survey for this classification, which in this example would be Plumbers. 0198 indicates the local union number or district council number where applicable, i.e., Plumbers Local 0198. The next number, 005 in the example, is an internal number used in processing the wage determination. 07/01/2014 is the effective date of the most current negotiated rate, which in this example is July 1, 2014.

Union prevailing wage rates are updated to reflect all rate changes in the collective bargaining agreement (CBA) governing this classification and rate.

Survey Rate Identifiers

Classifications listed under the "SU" identifier indicate that no one rate prevailed for this classification in the survey and the published rate is derived by computing a weighted average rate based on all the rates reported in the survey for that classification. As this weighted average rate includes all rates reported in the survey, it may include both union and non-union rates. Example: SULA2012-007 5/13/2014. SU indicates the rates are survey rates based on a weighted average calculation of rates and are not majority rates. LA indicates the State of Louisiana. 2012 is the year of survey on which these classifications and rates are based. The next number, 007 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 5/13/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

Survey wage rates are not updated and remain in effect until a new survey is conducted.

Union Average Rate Identifiers

Classification(s) listed under the UAVG identifier indicate that no single majority rate prevailed for those classifications; however, 100% of the data reported for the classifications was union data. EXAMPLE: UAVG-OH-0010 08/29/2014. UAVG indicates that the rate is a weighted union average rate. OH indicates the state. The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

WAGE DETERMINATION APPEALS PROCESS

1.) Has there been an initial decision in the matter? This can be:

- * an existing published wage determination
- * a survey underlying a wage determination
- * a Wage and Hour Division letter setting forth a position on

a wage determination matter

* a conformance (additional classification and rate) ruling

On survey related matters, initial contact, including requests for summaries of surveys, should be with the Wage and Hour Regional Office for the area in which the survey was conducted because those Regional Offices have responsibility for the Davis-Bacon survey program. If the response from this initial contact is not satisfactory, then the process described in 2.) and 3.) should be followed.

With regard to any other matter not yet ripe for the formal process described here, initial contact should be with the Branch of Construction Wage Determinations. Write to:

2.) If the answer to the question in 1.) is yes, then an interested party (those affected by the action) can request review and reconsideration from the Wage and Hour Administrator (See 29 CFR Part 1.8 and 29 CFR Part 7). Write to:

The request should be accompanied by a full statement of the interested party's position and by any information (wage payment data, project description, area practice material, etc.) that the requestor considers relevant to the issue.

3.) If the decision of the Administrator is not favorable, an interested party may appeal directly to the Administrative Review Board (formerly the Wage Appeals Board). Write to:

4.) All decisions by the Administrative Review Board are final.
